King's acted rapidly to help students and staff displaced by Ukraine, forming a partnership with Citizens UK that will help to bring Ukrainians to Britain as part of the Homes for Ukraine scheme. Our Sanctuary Programme is also providing support to enable refugee students to continue their studies.



Two staff and 10 alumni were honoured in the Queen's Birthday Honours 2022. Among the recipients were two alumni knighted for their service to the medical field, both nationally and internationally.



War Studies at 60. The Department of War Studies celebrated its 60th anniversary this year. Since the department's establishment in 1962, it has grown from a handful of PhD students and one MA programme to a large and vibrant community of 1,500 students.



King's Business School celebrated its 5th year as a King's faculty. The School is now one of the largest providers of undergraduate management teaching in London. Over 1,000 students are registered on master's degrees, and there is a growing number of research students.






Building the change-makers of tomorrow

King's is committed to making the world a better place, and a crucial way we can achieve this is by recognising talent and removing barriers to realising its potential. It is through the incredible diversity of our student population that we can go out into the world in service of its communities.

The Civic Leadership Academy (CLA) helps to make this a reality by providing vital work experience to students who may otherwise miss out on unpaid opportunities.

Over the last year, second-year students enrolled in the CLA have been working with charities such as Opening Doors and the Migration Museum to address some of London's most complex needs while accessing work experience and mentorship they may not otherwise have had, boosting their self-confidence, leadership and networking skills.

Paving the way for future research

Sustainability is the golden thread running through King's engineering research, and we're excited about how these research activities will make people's lives greener, easier and safer – for example, by scaling food protein technology to help feed the world. King's expertise on the war in Ukraine shared around the world

Since the war in Ukraine broke out, researchers and academics from King's have been using their expertise to inform discussion and debate around the war and its far-reaching consequences.

Our experts have seen their work reach audiences far and wide – from Europe to the US and Australia.

The Ukraine Explained series contains pieces covering a wide range of topics, with everything from what the EU and international community could be doing, to how the war is being perceived in Russia, the use of social media in the war, and the potential risk from biological or chemical weapons.



Driving the response to COVID-19 through the COVID-19 Symptom Study app

Throughout the pandemic, King's has been at the forefront of COVID-19 research. The ZOE COVID Symptom Study app was launched right at the beginning of the outbreak. With over four million users, the app became the world's largest ongoing study into the virus.

The study has helped shape health policy, flagging key symptoms of the virus – such as loss of taste and smell – and highlighting how early symptoms may differ among age groups. The app also helped to predict local hotspots, such as Leicester in the second wave.

While COVID-19 is not as prominent as it was, the app continues to analyse data in an ever-increasing vaccinated population, with a focus on long COVID. King's has also collaborated with other institutions to identify the key symptoms of long COVID, focusing on future research. This will help accelerate the development of evidence-based treatments for this major healthcare challenge.



Shaping the next generation of mobile networks with '6G Futures'

Last summer, King's combined its expertise on 5G and future networks to establish '6G Futures', a leading centre for 6G research, education and innovation, in collaboration with the University of Bristol.

The centre is home to globally recognised experts from the two universities, whose pioneering work brought 5G into the mainstream. Through the partnership, we hope to put the UK and King's at the forefront of mobile networks, research and innovation, helping to improve community connectivity and address digital poverty.



Reversing US policy on torture evidence

Research led by students at our King's Legal Clinic has helped bring about an important reinstatement of the principles of international law in relation to evidence obtained through torture.

The United States Department of Justice (DoJ) filed a new submission in the case of Guantanamo detainee Abd al-Rahim al-Nashiri, mirroring the argument made in an amicus ('friend of the court') submission from The Dickson Poon School of Law.

The submission drew on research into international human rights law carried out by students from King's Legal Clinic. In its submission, the DoJ accepted (for the first time in this case) the inadmissibility of statements obtained while Mr al-Nashiri was in CIA custody.



'It's incredible that since the amicus submission was filed, the US Government has reconsidered its position and concluded that the prohibition on admission of statements obtained through torture applies to all stages of a military commission case.' Helping refugee students continue their education

You may have seen our Students of Sanctuary Appeal earlier this year, launched to help support students from all around the globe, forcibly displaced due to conflict, to realise their educational potential.

In May 2022, the United Nations reported that there are now more than 100 million people forcibly displaced across the world. Forced displacement particularly impacts on young people, who face many challenges in accessing and continuing their education.

Here at King's, our vision is to make the world a better place. We believe everyone should have the opportunity to receive a first-class education. This is why, seven years ago, we started the Sanctuary Programme, with the aim of creating positive opportunities for refugee students.

The programme encompasses a wide range of initiatives to help address educational inequality and promote social mobility and social justice – including scholarships, access to digital learning, and refugee sponsorship. Through our work, we have been able to support students from many countries, including Myanmar, Syria, Afghanistan, Iran, Ukraine and the UK.

We are proud to be at the forefront of providing vital support to those displaced by conflict and, in 2020, we were honoured to be named as the first 'Refugees Welcome' university by Citizens UK.

Through the Sanctuary Programme, we are continuing to support students displaced by conflict. We've teamed up with Citizens UK to develop a new University Sponsorship Model, helping other UK universities to implement Homes for Ukraine – the scheme supporting Ukrainian refugees and academics fleeing the war in Ukraine by finding them welcoming homes here in London.

With wars happening all around the globe, the need to support forcibly displaced students has never been greater. With the help of many of you, who generously donated to the Students of Sanctuary Appeal, we can assist even more students whose education has been disrupted by conflict. Freetown explosion: Caring for burn survivors in Sierra Leone

King's is a long-term partner to the Government of Sierra Leone, with a small clinical team based at Connaught Hospital since 2013.

The partnership draws on the skills and expertise of the UK's National Health Service (in particular, a network of clinicians from across King's Health Partners' three NHS Foundation Trusts).

We experienced the benefits of this partnership first hand during the aftermath of an explosion in Freetown, the capital of Sierra Leone. On the night of 5 November 2021, the collision of a fuel tanker resulted in a major explosion. People rushed to collect fuel from the leaking vehicle, which then exploded, with more than 100 people dying and many more being injured and requiring urgent treatment.

Some of those who survived were critically unwell with severe, life-changing burns, requiring immediate specialist care and longer-term support. There were also several people with less severe burns, treated in outpatient facilities but still requiring care from nurses and therapists. Effective aftercare, rehabilitation and therapy are essential in helping a burns patient to recover. At the time, none of the hospitals in Freetown had a specialist burns unit,





leaving patients vulnerable to the risk of disfigurement, disability and even death.

King's Global Health Partners supported frontline staff at these hospitals, sending a team of burns specialists from the UK to support their colleagues at hospitals in Freetown. This team provided training and handson mentoring while also developing a bank of training resources to help improve the burns management system in Sierra Leone going forward.

As well as the support from the team on the ground, the project received generous philanthropic support, with the funds raised helping to train nurses, therapists and nutritionists at Connaught Hospital in the treatment and rehabilitation of burns patients. These funds have also helped provide a three- to six-month supply of burns consumables (dressings, IV fluids) and supplies to prevent infection (detergent, soap). Thank you to all who have supported King's Health Partners in the last year – you are helping to ensure projects like these can continue to drive life-changing impact for people all over the world.
